The imagined world is what stuck with me most because it showed me the magic of love and that you are the dreamer of dreams, holding the power to create any worlds you want.

3) What work are you currently most proud of?

I am currently most proud of The Fall Gauntlet series, which is a collection of sci-fi short stories based on estranged brothers trying to get their family back. There will be nine short stories in the collection. I'm thrilled with how the covers came out!

4) What advice would you give to others about the creative side of what you do?

Strike a balance between your deepest passions and what is salable in the market when it comes to your creative ideas. Write the story that only you can write that you know people will want to read. Be clear on why people will like it and play to your strengths.

5) What advice would you give to others about the business side of what you do?

Be relentless in your pursuit of accomplishing your goals. Treat your writing hobby or passion as such and that's all it will ever be. Treat it like a business and a career (if that is what you want), take steps to get there, and that's what it will become.
